



PARASITE SEASON

LET'S NOT FORGET ABOUT OUR CATS



THE PARASITE GANG



★ HEARTWORM THE KILLER ★

The Heartworm is a long slender worm growing to almost a foot long. This desperado hides out in the dog's heart and lungs. It is guilty of damaging the heart, the lungs, the liver and murder. It has been stopping hearts for decades. The sinister heartworm does not work alone, it uses the mosquito to travel from dog to dog. When hunting down the Heartworm a blood test is required. If you find Heartworm, it cannot be approached alone. Many harsh and expensive medications, and a lot of veterinary care will be needed to take it down. Beware, the battle to kill Heartworm can be deadly. The best way to manage the Heartworm is to prevent it. Annual blood testing and monthly medication just might do it. The best time to hunt Heartworm is in the spring, and prevention is throughout the summer from June 1st to November.

★ THE LYME SLINGING TICK ★

The dastardly tick starts as small as a speck of dust and grows as it feeds off its victim's blood. Once it's done, it can leave behind a posse of bacteria that causes Lyme disease. This bushwhacker likes to hide in tall grass and the leafy material under trees, just waiting to ambush innocent folks and their pets. While it does not like a deep freeze, the tick will start invading our spaces as soon as the temperature reaches 0°c. Look for this critter around the ears, neck, groin and armpits of your pets. To stamp out this varmint, our dogs and cats need tick stomping medication from March to December. Fortunately, Lyme disease can be detected with the same blood test that detects its deadly parasite gang partner Heartworm. Warning, some of the medications available to our dogs can be toxic to cats so best to consult your town's veterinarian.

★ FLEA THE CAUSER OF ITCH ★

The flea is one of the founding members of the Parasite Gang. This scoundrel has been making our pets itch for eons. One female flea can lay thousands of eggs, and the resultant larva live in your sofa, carpets and beds. Once they have invaded your homestead, they can take months to drive out. The Flea is in cahoots with the Tapeworm, it often comes along for the ride. The tapeworm hunkers down in the intestinal tract and is known for robbing our pets of precious nutrients. Best not to welcome these outlaws into town to start with. Some of the medications that prevent the rest of this gang from establishing a settlement in your pet will also deter the Flea. Yee-haw. Warning, some of the medications available to our dogs can be toxic to cats so best to consult your town's veterinarian.


