



The Bottom Line

Every year we see more and more ticks. The tick of most concern in this area is the Deer tick, also called Black Legged Tick or Ixodes scapularis. This is the tick that carries Lyme Disease, Anaplasma and Ehrlichia.

Did you know that the Brown Dog Tick, also found in this area, can reproduce in your home. The thought makes me cringe!



TICKS IN THE WINTER? SERIOUSLY?

Seriously! I hate to say it, but we are seeing ticks even in January and February.

When I first graduated, all those many, many years ago, I barely knew what a tick was. I was taught it was a creepy little disease carrying parasite that lived in far away lands where it is warm and sunny all the time. The price some have to pay for living in a nicer climate, I told myself. Did that sound jealous? Not that our cold Canadian winters protected us completely from parasites, but we at least had a break for the winter and the early spring months. Not anymore! Our winters have been milder overall and every month we seem to get spurts of warmer, almost spring like weather. And while we might enjoy the warm breaks, so do the parasites living among us.

So what parasites should we be worried about in the winter months?

Ticks

Ticks are actively seeking to feed anytime the temperature warms to above 0 degrees Celsius. So any dogs, cats or people within their reach potentially become breakfast, lunch or dinner.

Remember where the ticks are found, in the grass, bushes, trees and leaves. If your dog or cat ventures out, even in the winter, you should strongly consider year round tick prevention.

Intestinal parasites

Roundworm and hookworm eggs are very resistant to freezing; they can survive temperatures of -20'C for many weeks. Wow!

Both the Center for Disease Control and the Companion Animal Parasite Council (CAPC) in the USA recommend that all pets receive year-round broad-spectrum parasite control against intestinal parasites. In Canada, the risk of intestinal parasite transmission is somewhat lower than in the warmer areas of the USA. So here, the best approach to intestinal parasite control is risk based. Ask yourself this:

- Pet risk: Does my dog spend time off leash? Does my dog lick the grass or eat poop when out on a walk? Does my dog eat a raw meat diet? Is my dog frequently exposed to heavily contaminated environments like dog parks? Does my cat go outside? Does my cat hunt?
- Household risk: Is my dog a service animal? Does my dog or cat have contact with young children under the age of 3, pregnant women, or immunocompromised people?

The Bottom Line

Stoop & Scoop the Poop is not just about cleaning up the mess, it's about parasite prevention. From an infected dog or cat, microscopic eggs are passed out in the poop. These eggs can survive in the environment long after the poop is broken down and aone. You many never know how contaminated your yard or favourite park is. Cleaning up after your dog helps prevent the spread.

Yes to any of these questions **=** high risk pet and household. We recommend:

- High risk households need to be concerned about parasitic zoonoses (the spread of disease from animals to humans).
- These dogs and cats need more frequent fecal testing and deworming, a minimum of 4 times per year
- Better yet, they should remain on tick and parasite prevention year round.

Low risk pets and low risk households \neq no risk. These pets should still:

- Get tested (poop sample) and treated yearly
- It is also appropriate to treat only if eggs are detected on fecal testing, particularly if using the new antigen and PCR tests, which have high sensitivity.

Again, if your dog or cat ventures out, and falls into the higher risk lifestyle, or there are vulnerable people in the house, then we recommend year round intestinal worm prevention on top of the year round tick prevention.


